2024 in Review

The Move Toward a Right-Sized Court System Continues

In 2024 the Judicial Branch continued to focus on our plan to right-size the Branch by filling the new positions created by the Legislature and by implementing Maine eCourts, Maine's electronic court case management and eFiling system.

From July 2023 through the end of 2024, the Judicial Branch hired additional clerks, deputy marshals, and courtroom technology assistants to strengthen the court system and keep our dockets moving. Although job retention remains a challenge, we have seen a marked improvement in retention rates this year.

Status of the Backlog

Judges and staff worked hard to reduce the case backlog precipitated by the COVID-19 pandemic. The case backlog refers to the number of pending cases above the 2019 baseline average. The charts inside this report provide additional information about the backlog.

One obstacle to reducing the backlog of criminal and family cases is the shortage of attorneys available to take court-appointed cases. Fewer available defense attorneys have strained the courts' ability to appoint counsel in these cases in a timely manner. Although we are working with the Maine Commission on Public Defense Services (MCPDS) to provide regular lists of cases in which attorneys are needed, the shrinking list of attorneys has made it harder to reduce the backlog. Courts cannot hear the merits of these cases unless the parties have counsel. Chief Justice Stanfill has championed efforts to recruit more MCPDS rostered attorneys with the Maine Bar and will continue to do so.

Maine eCourts and eFiling Moves Forward

Also in 2024, the Judicial Branch continued to deploy Maine eCourts for all civil case types in Rumford, Farmington, and South Paris courts, followed by Protection from Abuse and Harassment cases in all Region 3 courts and Bangor.

Planning for the implementation of criminal and juvenile case types in Region 3 began in 2024. We expect to begin deploying these case types in 2025.

Civics Outreach with Maine Schools

The Judicial Branch has continued its outreach efforts with Maine schools to help students learn how justice is administered, and to make them aware of the various career opportunities that exist within the Judicial Branch. The Maine Supreme Judicial Court heard oral arguments at three Maine high schools in October 2024, thereby giving students a chance to witness the appellate process firsthand. Also, high school students from around the state visited courts in Portland, Augusta and Bangor to watch trial court proceedings, tour a courthouse, and visit with a judge or justice about how a court docket is administered. The Judicial Branch continues to welcome school and community groups into our courthouses.




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

FY24 REVENUE






REVENUE DISTRIBUTED BY THE JUDICIAL BRANCH

Revenue collected by the Judicial Branch is deposited into the State's General Fund and to other State-dedicated accounts as required by Maine Statutes.




PENDING CASE BACKLOG

The charts on this page provide a high-level summary of the changes to the Judicial Branch's pending caseload, highlighting both the progress that has been made and the persistence of the backlog in some areas. The COVID-19 pandemic brought unprecedented disruption to the daily fuctioning of Maine courts. The courts adopted the CDC guidelines regarding personal contact, which limited the number of in-person proceedings, especially jury trials, that the courts could safely conduct during the pandemic. As the Judicial Branch adapted to the challenges of operating in the pandemic and adopted technology to facilitate remote hearings, it slowly regained capacity to hear all case types. However, significant backlogs of pending cases remain in the UCD and family matters docket.

While there are numerous contributing factors to the pending case backlog that can't be captured in this overview, at least some of the backlog in UCD and family matters cases is attributable to a shortage of lawyers handling criminal, juvenile, and protective custody court-appointed work.


The courts have made progress in addressing the backlog of cases in civil matters, as the charts below show.

Pending Unified Criminal Docket Cases 2019 - 2024





COURTHOUSE FACILITIES

Planning is Underway for New Courthouse Facilities

In 2024, the Maine Legislature granted authority to the Judicial Branch to use bond proceeds in the amount of \$205M issued by the Maine Governmental Facilities Authority (MGFA) to build or expand three courthouses in Hancock, Somerset, and Androscoggin counties. The courthouse facilities presently serving these counties are out of date. They do not have adequate room and infrastructure to accommodate modern technology, modern security features, and additional courtrooms needed to serve their communities. Upon completion of each project, court services will be moved from the current location into each new facility, consolidating operations of the two trial courts for each county.

Hancock Judicial Center (HJC)

The Hancock Judicial Center is a new courthouse construction project. It will be built in Ellsworth and will house both the Superior Court and the District Court for Hancock County, and a court clerk's office for both courts. The HJC will be fully ADA compliant, with ample room for public parking, more courtrooms and conference rooms, and other features to provide for the comfort and safety of the public. The Judicial Branch expects to break ground on the project in the summer of 2026.

Somerset Judicial Center (SJC)

The Judicial Branch will add onto the current building housing the Skowhegan District Court to create the SJC. The expansion will include jury trial courtrooms, conference rooms, enhanced safety and technology features, and more space for the clerk's office. The SJC will be fully ADA compliant. The Judicial Branch expects to break ground on this facility in the summer of 2026.

Androscoggin Judicial Center (AJC)

The Judicial Branch expects to begin work on the new Androscoggin Judicial Center, which will house both the Lewiston District Court and Androscoggin Superior Court, in the summer of 2027. The AJC will be located on Lisbon Street in Lewiston, comprising the current location of the District Court and the building adjacent to it (the former Depositors Trust/KeyBank building). The project will involve renovating the new building and connecting it to the current District Court building. The new facility will have both jury and non-jury courtrooms, additional conference room and hearing room space, and be fully equipped with updated safety and technology features. As with the other projects, the AJC will be fully ADA compliant.
